

OPTARSS II Win Announcement

Trailboss, as a subcontractor to HCI, is on one of the winning teams for the OPTARSS II contract. OPTARSS – Operations, Planning, Training, and Resource Support Services – is a very large U.S. Army Forces Command (FORSCOM) program which provides expedited support services to the Army and other Department of Defense (DoD) activities throughout the U.S. and overseas. OPTARSS is a multiple award, indefinite delivery/ indefinite quantity task order contract.

While no work is guaranteed under the contract, the winning contractor teams are eligible to bid on task orders in the areas of operational planning, training, modeling and simulation, flight operations, mobilization plans and execution, deployment operations, force protection, transformation, and supporting areas. There are both large business (unrestricted) and small business tracks, and task orders under OPTARSS II have a ceiling of \$2.5 billion over the next five years.

This was an extended procurement effort, one that has been in the works for several years. President/CEO Joseph Tolliver summed it up: "OPTARSS awards are coveted and sought after by companies large and small. HCI assembled a winning team of business partners, and we couldn't be prouder to be among them."

TEI's Safety Corner

Issue 4

With the award of Trailboss's new contract performing Aerospace Ground Equipment/General Maintenance Equipment (AGE/GME) at Hill AFB, Trailboss' Safety Program takes on a whole new perspective in Shop Safety and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). Along with routine shop activities, AGE/GME includes Welding Shops, Paint Shops, and abrasive blasting operations to strip equipment of previous paint coatings.

To prevent mishaps, we need to apply safe operating practices of specialized equipment, tools, and machinery according to the operating specifications and maintain strict situational awareness. Proper use of PPE will prevent mishaps and incidents. All Trailboss managers and employees are expected to employ strict application of safety principles and use of PPE.

In paint booths, ensuring adequate ventilation of fresh air to direct fumes out through an exhaust outlet reduces vapor buildup and prevents exposure. Ceiling filters should be changed a minimum of twice per year and intake filters changed monthly. According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), filters in spray booths remove 90 to 99 percent of mist fumes and particles. Ventilation is a concern in welding shops and may be obtained from natural or mechanical means (such as vacuum systems).

Abrasive blasting presents risks for employee's health and safety, specifically in portable air blasting or blast room (booth) applications. Although many abrasives used in blasting rooms are not hazardous in themselves, their use may present serious danger to operators, such as burns due to projections (with skin or eye lesions), falls due to walking on round shots scattered on the ground, exposure to hazardous dusts, heat exhaustion, creation of an explosive atmosphere, or exposure to excessive noise.

Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) mandates engineered solutions to potential hazards. Typical safety equipment includes positive pressure blast hood or helmet; Grade D air supply (or self contained oil-less air pump); ear protection; and body protection. Use of PPE is mandatory, not optional.

Initial and refresher training is key to Shop Safety. Management surveillance reinforces Trailboss' commitment to safety and helps identify non-compliance of safety practices and use of PPE.



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Trailboss's Successful ISO 9001 Assessment




Can you rent "regular" cars or do they have to be 4-wheel drive? Do you need chains in the winter? Rental cares are available year round. You have the same options as in the Continental U.S. Four-wheel drive vehicles are not required in Anchorage, regardless of season and chains are not required in the winter, although most residents use studded winter tires. During the winter, Anchorage-area roads are plowed on a regular basis.

Will I have to sleep in an igloo? No. There aren't any igloos in Anchorage. However, we have plenty of first class hotel rooms and suites, plus lodge and resort properties, and plenty of B&B's.
